# Christmas is not cancelled!

The prospect of a Christmas without large-scale celebrations is preying on minds. After the widespread cancellation of pantomimes, festive light "switch-ons" and other community activities, it seems likely that 2020s festivities will be much more intimate affairs, potentially with households banned from mixing indoors. Headlines in tabloid newspapers have indicated whether or not they think the Government is going to cancel Christmas.

Yes, things will be very different this year. But Christmas is not cancelled!

In 1647, Parliament had won the civil war in England, Scotland and Ireland and King Charles was held in captivity at Hampton Court. The Church of England had been abolished and replaced by a Presbyterian system, and holy days, Christmas included, were abolished. The usual festivities were deemed unacceptable, shops had to stay open (including on Christmas Day), decorations were banned, and feasting and the consumption of alcohol were restricted. Church Services on Christmas Day were banned.

The reasons for the restrictions are very different this year – this year the restrictions are not about an ideology but about a pandemic and about keeping us all safe and well.

In 1647 many people broke the rules and were arrested. But the true Christmas was not cancelled in 1647 and nor is it in 2020! The government can stop us travelling and having large intergenerational gatherings but they cannot cancel Christmas.

The Christmas season, especially in the West, is a mix of pre-Christian, Christian, and secular traditions. 'Christmas' literally means Christian Mass. It's a shortened form of Christ's Mass. Christmas is a time of spiritual reflection on the important foundations of the Christian faith. It's also a celebration. It's when we

celebrate God's love for the world through the birth of the Christ child: Jesus.

We need perhaps to look at Christmas differently this year but Christmas is not cancelled!

Most of you reading this article will have had lockdown birthdays – celebrations were not as you would have wished – but your birthday still happened. So for us as Christians, the Birth of Christ is a fact of history and we can still celebrate the message of the incarnation. As Charles Wesley put it (StF 208):

Let earth and heaven combine,
Angels and all agree
To praise in songs divine, the incarnate Deity,
Our God contracted to a span,
incomprehensibly made man.

This is what we are celebrating and remembering and no pandemic and no government can take that away from any Christian in the world. We are just going to have to find different ways to celebrate our faith this year! And remember:

When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky is gone, when the kings and princes are home, when the shepherds are back with their flocks,

the work of Christmas begins:
to find the lost, to heal the broken,
to feed the hungry,
to release the prisoner,
to rebuild the nations,
to bring peace among the people,
to make music in the heart.

Now the Work of Christmas Begins by Howard Thurman

This is our vocation as Christians because of the first Christmas Day. Christmas is not cancelled! With all good wishes for Christmas and for the year that is to come.


Best laid plans...

## Christmas charity 2020 Kidney Care UK



Running was never something I saw myself doing. A few 'light jogs' at university in a bid to try and stay healthy was about as far as it went. But that all changed last year when I found out I had got a place in the London Marathon. Why would I enter if I wasn't a runner?

Very good question. For me it wasn't about running or myself. I wanted to do it for my Mum. For my marathon place wasn't in the usual public ballot, but a charity place that was very close to my heart -Kidney Care UK.

My mother, Sue Finch, was diagnosed with Polycystic Kidney Disease (PKD) in her mid-20s. The same

disease that sadly saw her lose her own father when she was just 9 years old. PKD is an incurable and unpredictable disease, causing multiple cysts to develop on the surface of the kidneys with symptoms including high blood pressure, extreme pain due to cysts

bursting or expanding, kidney stones and eventually renal failure.

And that was exactly what happened to Mum and why I'm here telling this story. In the early 2010s her condition worsened rapidly with her kidney function dropping to dangerous levels with multiple hospital stays and

> her eventually having to give up work. The only thing that would keep her alive would be to have a transplant but with extremely long donor waiting lists and her condition getting worse every day, we weren't hopeful.

In November 2012 we were truly blessed, a close family friend had stepped in and offered to be a donor for her. They were a successful

match and he saved her life and became our hero.

In families with PKD, there is a 50% chance that a parent with PKD will pass it on to their child. In 2018, this was confirmed when I was also diagnosed.

Kidney Care is the UK's leading patient support charity, providing practical, financial and emotional support for kidney patients and their families whilst campaigning to improve care services across the UK. Their support has been invaluable to me while I adjust to my diagnosis and what living with PKD as a young adult will be like.

Over the last year I have put my body (and high blood pressure) through the ultimate test and taken part in several half marathons as part of my training.

As with so many other things this year - the London Marathon was cancelled but I took part in the virtual London Marathon on 4th October (in the pouring rain!) through the streets of Potters Bar and look forward to running it for real in 2021. I am pledging to raise over £2000 for this amazing charity and cannot thank St John's enough for choosing it as their Christmas charity this year and look forward to sharing my London Marathon experience with you! It is fair to say we're all a bit uncertain about what Christmas is going to be like this year - and perhaps we're feeling a bit anxious about this. It's also fair to say that this year as much as ever it is critical we reach out to people who aren't part of our churches. The Christmas message of Emmanuel – the good news that God is with us – feels perhaps more pertinent than ever before in this extraordinary year.

The Methodist Church Christmas campaign for 2020 #GodIsWithUs seeks to share this good news through twentyfour stories of individuals and their experiences of this extraordinary year. Each day of Advent will focus on a testimony from somebody connected to the Methodist Church reflecting on what hope has looked like for them this year and how they have experienced God with them.

The individuals whose stories the campaign tells include those who have felt the painful effects of isolation this year, who have experienced extreme poverty, who have struggled with poor mental health, who have lost loved ones – like so many millions of others. But ultimately, incredibly, God's

loving presence radiates from each of them in beams of powerful hope. Hope that is so necessary for such a time as this.

The campaign name, which ties in with our Presidential theme for the year, of course comes from John Wesley's purported words on his death bed: 'the best of all is, God is with us' which reminds us that, even in the times which feel most uncertain, we can be certain of God.

Graham Phillips will be leading the All Age Christingle Service on **Sunday 6th December**, but what are the origins of the Christingle Service?

On 20th December, 1747, John de Watteville led a children's service in his Moravian church in Marienborn, Germany. He read out verses written by the children to celebrate the birth of Jesus, and explained that happiness comes through knowing Jesus, who "has kindled in each little heart a flame which keeps burning to their joy and our happiness". He went on to illustrate that 'flame', giving each child a little lighted wax candle, tied around with a red ribbon.

The visual aid was a great success with the children, and the candle and red ribbon came to be remembered every year. As the Moravians began to travel beyond Germany, so they took the custom with them.

In Moravian churches, the Christingle Service is usually held on the Sunday before Christmas or on Christmas Eve. The website for the Moravian Church says: "We are glad that the Moravian Church has been able to make this contribution to the wider Christian world."

Over 50 people came together virtually on Saturday 14th November to take part in the Tearfund Big Quiz night at St John's. It was a really good evening and everyone had a great time. We used Zoom to switch between a single presentation of the questions and breaking into team groups to discuss their answers. In the middle we showed a video from Tearfund about their work. We raised £885 plus £216.25 in Gift Aid which was fantastic.

Overall, the Big Quiz has raised (at the time of writing) £196,624, with over 450 churches taking part.

#### **Tearfund write:**

Every pound raised will transform the lives of people in need. People just like Alaya.

Alaya lives in Malawi with her husband, Bazwell, and their three young children. Frequent flooding washes away the little food they have, and brings diseases such as cholera and diarrhoea. Her crops fail, again and again.

This means that, for 11 months of the year, Alaya and her family are hungry surviving on just one meal a day.

With help from our local partner, Alaya and Bazwell are learning new ways to work the land under these tough conditions. Training like this is saving lives. Its giving people, like Alaya, a way to lift their families out of poverty for the long haul. Its more than just making sure they have enough food to survive.

For millions of people around the world, including Alaya, poverty is a huge barrier that stops them from enjoying life in its fullness. But, thanks to the funds raised through the Big Quiz Night, The local partner can continue to do all they can to help people like Alaya and her family get back on their feet. And flourish.
